Over the past few years, it seems like we have been riding a wave at the Giessen School of Theology. We're enjoying a phase of expansion. Our stu-

dent body has been growing, and we're gaining more and more friends and supporters. Our building project is moving forward, and our new facilities will accommodate 250 students preparing for Christian ministry – more than ever before, but the need is great!

1,400: That's how many alumni we have so far. They live in 45 countries. Half of them serve the Lord in pastoral ministry, and they are doing a great job. What many don't know is that the other half work not in a church, but in some other capacity: as journalists, teachers of religion in

the public schools, Bible translators, counselors, missionaries, theology professors, social workers, and much more. The GST trains more people for work in parachurch organizations than any other institution of higher learning in Germany.

Some of our graduates have gone on to acquire other qualifications and work in business, law, psychology, or politics. They wanted a solid evangelical theology as the basis for their endeavors in other fields, and they are making a difference in our society.

Every graduate has a unique biography and calling, and we stand behind all of them. God calls his people to serve in many different capacities, both in the Church and in the world. Every person on the planet needs the Lord – small children and nursing home residents, remote people groups in Siberia and postmodern urbanites in Berlin. Our vision is to train dynamic messengers of hope for all kinds of people in all kinds of places.

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



In the last issue of Focus Germany, we informed you about a new non-profit based in Florida called "Friends of the Giessen School of Theology". A board was formed and met for the first time last summer. It is presently made up of four members: Joel White, Professor of New Testament at the GST, Jimmy Thomas, a business man in Tampa, Florida, and a longtime supporter of the GST, Suzan Hicks, missions pastor of a large church in Nashville, Tennessee, who spent several years as missionary in Germany, and Ditmar Pauck, a German national and a graduate of the GST who oversees the work of a Latin American mission from his base in Florida. At their first meeting the board laid out their purpose as follows: to help promote awareness of the Giessen School of Theology by recruiting students and raising up donors, encouraging travel to Germany to raise awareness of the spirituals needs there, and encouraging the faculty, staff, and students of the GST to carry out their calling faithfully and joyfully. The board will be visiting the GST in May to see how they can better serve the GST.
